The South Burnaby Garden Club is non-profit and meets on the First Tuesday of each month at 7:30 pm at the Bonsor Recreation Complex, 6550 Bonsor Avenue (Banquet Room, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor), Burnaby. There are regular club meetings including show bench in all months except January, September and December. Visitors are always welcome to attend.

The Fall Harvest Fair is held in September and a Christmas dinner is held in December. Club meetings are educational in theme – both for the experienced and novice gardener. The membership cost is \$25.00 for couples or families and \$20.00 for single.



## **Fall Harvest Fair Message**

The origins of the South Burnaby Garden Club go back to the turn of the previous century.

In those days, Burnaby, and the rest of the lower mainland, was an agricultural and mostly rural society. Refrigeration was only a dream and there was very little trade in foodstuffs between countries. People depended on themselves and local farmers to produce foods that could be stored for use in winter. It was up to each family to manage this process through the use of root cellars and by canning and pickling.

Harvest time was the high point of the year and citizens gathered together at a fall fair to show the results of their labour by displaying the best of their annual crops. They would visit with each other and generally celebrate the harvest. Preserves and flowers were also exhibited with prizes being awarded for the best entries.

One hundred and eighteen years later our Fall Harvest Fair persists. While many changes have occurred, the basic feelings of celebrating the growing season and our preparation for the winter remain. The Fair is our link with the past and helps us remember how independent we can be, if needed.

This year the parking lot will be full of cars rather than horse drawn buggies. Never mind – put a little imaginary straw in your hat and come sample 100 plus years of change.

## Our History

In January 1901 a group of Central Park residents met to form a Farmers' Institute (incorporated in May 1901). They leased seventeen acres of Central Park from the Provincial Government. With surprising speed they arranged for government grants and constructed a "*magnificent two-story building*". The building was described as "*second to none outside Victoria and New Westminster*" and was ready in time for the September 1901 Fall Fair.

In 1903 the Institute amalgamated with the South Vancouver and Burnaby Agricultural Society and became the Central Park Agricultural Association & Farmers Institute. They continued to hold successful Fall Fairs and improve the building and grounds. In 1906 their hard work was rewarded with a visit to their annual Fall Fair from B.C. Premier Richard McBride. In 1907 the membership doubled to five hundred twenty members. However, this was the pinnacle as increasing urbanization and World War 1 saw the last exhibition on 1919. The lease expired in 1921 and the building was demolished in 1924.

The society continued to meet and hold small exhibitions in rented halls under the name The South Burnaby Horticultural Association. After several name changes, the association became **THE SOUTH BURNABY GARDEN CLUB** in 1960.

Today the **SOUTH BURNABY GARDEN CLUB** is affiliated with the **B.C. COUNCIL OF GARDEN CLUBS**.





## **Annual Fall Harvest Fair Rules & Regulations**

1. This show is open to anyone desiring to exhibit. Only one exhibitor may enter in any one class from the same garden.
2. For identification purposes, each entry must be accompanied by a free entry tag and be identified with an exhibitor number. Your exhibitor number is your assigned show bench number. The free entry tags are available on our website at [www.southburnabygardenclub.ca](http://www.southburnabygardenclub.ca) . Exhibitor numbers and entry tags will be available at the June, July and August meetings as well as the Friday of the Show.
3. More than one entry per class will be allowed per exhibitor in all divisions provided each entry is a different named variety.
4. All exhibits must be in place by 10:00 am on the first day of the show, at which time the hall must be closed for judging to commence. Entries may be staged from 5:30 pm to 8:00 pm on Friday evening or from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, the first day of the show.
5. The Judges' decisions will be final in all cases.
6. The Club will provide plates for fruit and vegetables.
7. The Club will not be responsible for loss or damage to any article, although every effort will be taken to protect all personal items such as vases, etc.
8. All protests must be made in writing and be in the hands of the Fair Co-Chairs by 4:00 pm on the first day of the show, together with the exhibit in question and a \$5.00 fee for re-examination.
9. In the absence of competition in any Class, the Judges will give such awards as they deem worthy and no ribbon will be awarded if, in the opinion of the Judges, an exhibit is not of sufficient merit except in class B-18, B-43, B-44, B-45 and B-46.
10. Judging standards for flowers and vegetables will be those of the B.C. Council of Garden Clubs, modified to Horticultural Show Schedule.
11. Any exhibitor obtaining exhibits from another person and passing them off as his/her own production shall forfeit all prizes won and the exhibitor will be barred from exhibiting at future shows. All exhibits must be the exhibitors' own production but blooms, foliage and accessories in the Decorative Division may be purchased.



## Annual Fall Harvest Fair Rules & Regulations

(Continued)

12. Potted plants must be in exhibitor's possession for at least two months before the show.
13. For determining Division winners, three points will be awarded for first prize, two points for second and one point for third.
14. Any exhibitor who removes an exhibit before the show is declared closed will forfeit all prizes won for that and all other exhibits.
15. All Challenge Trophies are the property of the South Burnaby Garden Club and must be returned to the Club one year after winning. Winners who are not SBGC club members will be awarded rosettes in lieu of trophies.
16. Any competitor's garden, etc., may be inspected by a Committee at any time.
17. The Club reserves the right to refuse any entry.
18. Trophies will be distributed at the regular October meeting.
19. Any exhibits not removed by 4:30 pm on the last day of the show will, at the discretion of the committee, be disposed of.
20. Rules for Division J Decorative Exhibits:
  - Entries are limited to one exhibit per Class
  - An exhibit is plant material in a container with or without accessories.
  - Each exhibit must include fresh flowers and foliage **unless otherwise specified** and conform to the rules of the schedule.
  - No plastic, silk or other artificial plant material is allowed in any decorative class.
  - Abstract Creative Design is created through selections and organization of components in a non-naturalistic manner.
  - An accessory is anything that is added to the plant material in an exhibit, such as a figurine, decorative wood, etc. to emphasize or to help interpret the title.
  - There are three classes of exhibitors:
    - Beginner (Novice)**  
An exhibitor shows in the Beginner Category for the first three years and then advances to the Intermediate Category.
    - Intermediate**  
After exhibiting for three years in the Intermediate Category, the Intermediate advances to the Open Category.
    - Open (Senior)**  
The Open Category is open to everyone. A Beginner or intermediate may show up in this category but a Senior cannot show down into a lower one.



## Annual Fall Harvest Fair Rules & Regulations

(Continued)

21. Where there are five or more entries in an A.O.V. Class a second Class may be made with prizes as in the former class.
22. Definitions used in Divisions A, B, and F:
  - **A.O.V.** - Any Other Variety other than called for in the Schedule. Varieties already scheduled may not be included in this category.
  - **C.V.A.** - Colour Variation Allowed
  - **CUT** - Branch, may have leaves, buds and flowers
  - **DISTINCT** - All one variety and colour
  - **KIND** - The different genus of plants, such as cabbage, carrots, etc.
  - **PERENNIALS/ HARDY HERBACEIOUS** - Means those that die down to the ground in winter but come back in the spring.
  - **STEM** - May have flowers and buds but not side branches
  - **SPRAY** - Stem or branch, may have leaves, buds and flowers
  - **VARIETY** - The sort, such as (in cabbage) Early, Late, Savoy, etc. The variety should be named whenever possible.
23. All **sponsored** baking entries require recipes and some sponsored entries also require proof of purchase or product label. Check schedule.
24. **Division P "CRAFTS"** Submit a few comments describing your entry on a card. Is the craft your own design and colour scheme? Is it from a kit, copied from a book or was it rescued and recycled?
25. **Best in Show** is judged from the Most Meritorious Division.

**WINNER OF MOST POINTS IN DIVISION A** will be awarded the *Martin Danard Trophy*.

**WINNER OF MOST POINTS IN DIVISION B** (excluding largest in circumference onion) will be awarded the *Nature's Gold Trophy*.

**WINNER OF MOST POINTS IN FLOWERS FOR DIVISIONS D & F** combined will be awarded the *Mildred Wells Trophy*.

**WINNER OF THE LARGEST IN CIRCUMFERENCE ONION** will be awarded the *Richard Acton Trophy* donated by Elsie and Ray Luporini.

### **WINNER OF THE HEAVIEST POTATO CROP IN THE POTATO CONTEST**

will be awarded the Pete Greenaway Trophy donated by *Natures Gold*.

**WINNER OF BEST OF SHOW** will be awarded the *75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Trophy* donated by Tony Kulczycki.

**WINNER OF THE MOST POINTS DECORATIVE 'OPEN'** (must have been awarded a first place in this Division) will be awarded the *Rose Bowl* donated by Dr. Blythe Eagles.

**WINNER OF MOST POINTS DECORATIVE INTERMEDIATE** (must have been awarded a first place in this Division) will be awarded the *J.S. Moffitt Trophy*.

**WINNER OF MOST POINTS DECORATIVE BEGINNER** (must have been awarded a first place in this Division) will be awarded the *Challenge Trophy* donated by Mrs. Blythe Eagles.

**WINNER OF MOST POINTS IN BAKING AND CANNING CONTESTS** will be awarded the *Memorial Plaque* that honours club members that are now deceased.

**WINNER OF MOST POINTS IN JUNIOR CLASSES** will be awarded a *Junior Trophy* that can be kept by the winner.

**ROSETTES** will be awarded for the most points in Division C, Division P, and Division R until Trophies become available.

**MOST MERITORIOUS ENTRY** in each of Divisions A, B, C, D, F, J, L, M, P & R will be awarded a Most Meritorious Rosette.

All Trophies remain the property of the **SOUTH BURNABY GARDEN CLUB** and must be returned in August of the following year. In the event the winner of any of the above trophies is not a member of the South Burnaby Garden Club, a Rosette will be awarded in its place. ### **Merida Potato**

*Early season.* The tubers of Merida potatoes have smooth yellow skin over light yellow flesh. They have a highly oval shape and very shallow eyes. The flavour is excellent, and the size and shape of the tubers are very uniform. The high yielding plants have great disease resistance and early maturity, and the tubers have a long storage potential. These little golden spuds are great for steaming, boiling, & roasting.

Mignon Single

Height - 2'

Blooms - 2"

Color - Light Blend, Dark Pink & White

Very cute, petite blooms on short plant. Produces tons of great show quality blooms over a very long season.

**Ball and Pompon-** small, fully double globe-shaped flowers with petals blunt or slightly rounded at their tips.

**Cactus-** double flowers with long pointed ray petals that roll back giving them a pointed look.

**Decorative-** double with broad flat-tipped petals sometimes wavy.

**Laciniated-** petals are split at the end into two or more divisions.

**Water Lily-** fully double blooms with broad, generally sparse ray florets.

1. Over low heat, melt butter. Add marshmallows; stir until melted and well blended. Remove from heat.
2. Stir in vanilla, add cereal, stirring until coated.
3. Using lightly buttered spatula, press into buttered 13" x 9" pan.

#### **SUGGESTIONS:**

- Make "Fun Pops" by shaping warm cereal mix into balls, inserting wooden stick in each. Decorate as desired.
- Make "cutouts" press warm cereal into ½ inch layer – cut into shape with cookie cutter. Make balls of the warm cereal mix and assemble to represent an animal.
- When decorating, may use frosting, chocolates, nuts, coloured sugar, coconut, candies, etc.
